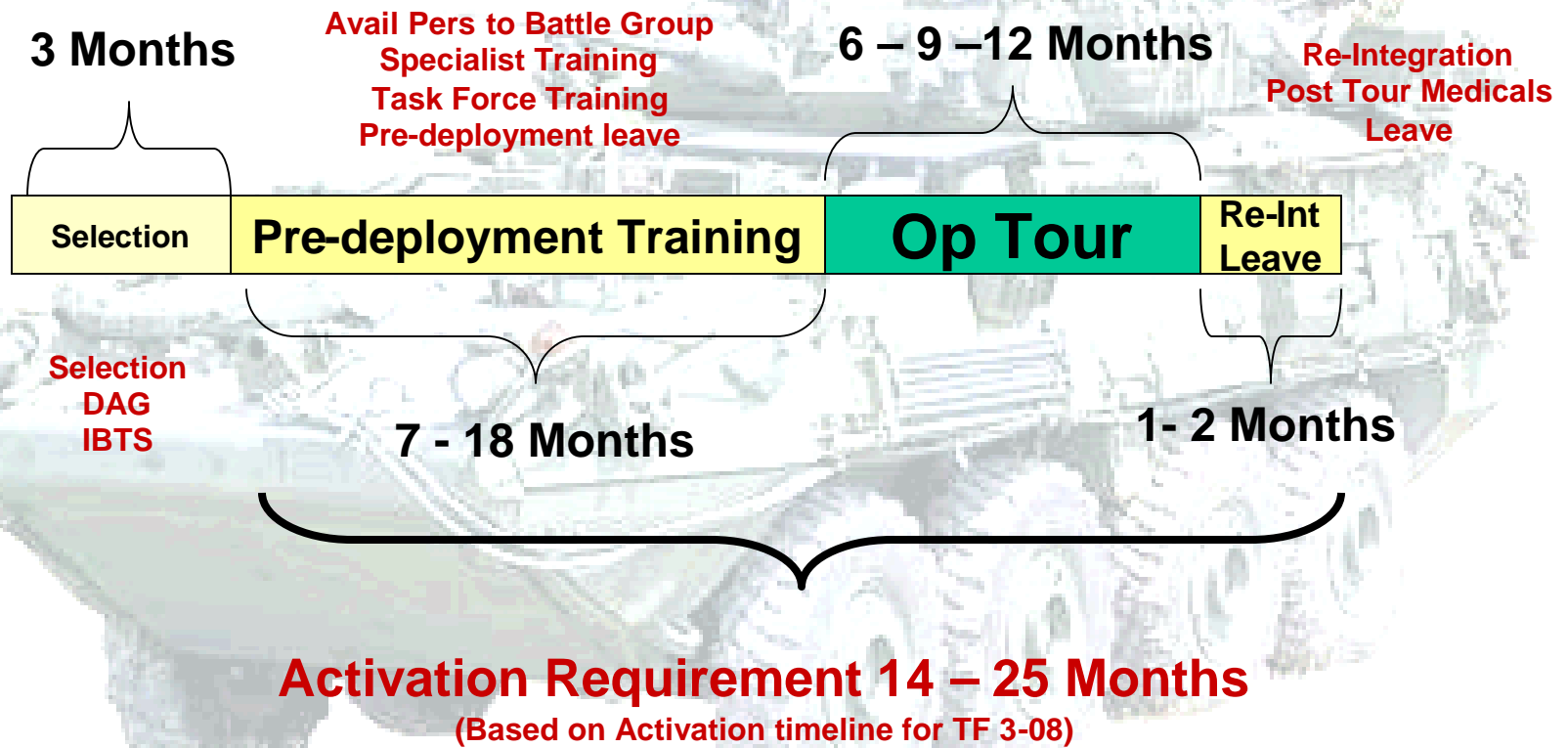


# *The Army's Reserve in Afghanistan*

- Army Reserve augmentation to Afghanistan Missions has been directed and targeted for up to 20% of Mission composition.
- Augmentation has occurred across the full spectrum of capabilities, (Private to Brigadier General, Fighting echelons to Strategic HQs)
- The Army Reserve has contributed a significant portion of the Civil Military Cooperation (CIMIC) and Psychological Warfare (PSYOPS) capabilities.
- Augmentation from the Army Reserve has been executed on a completely voluntary basis.



# Army Reserve Force Activation



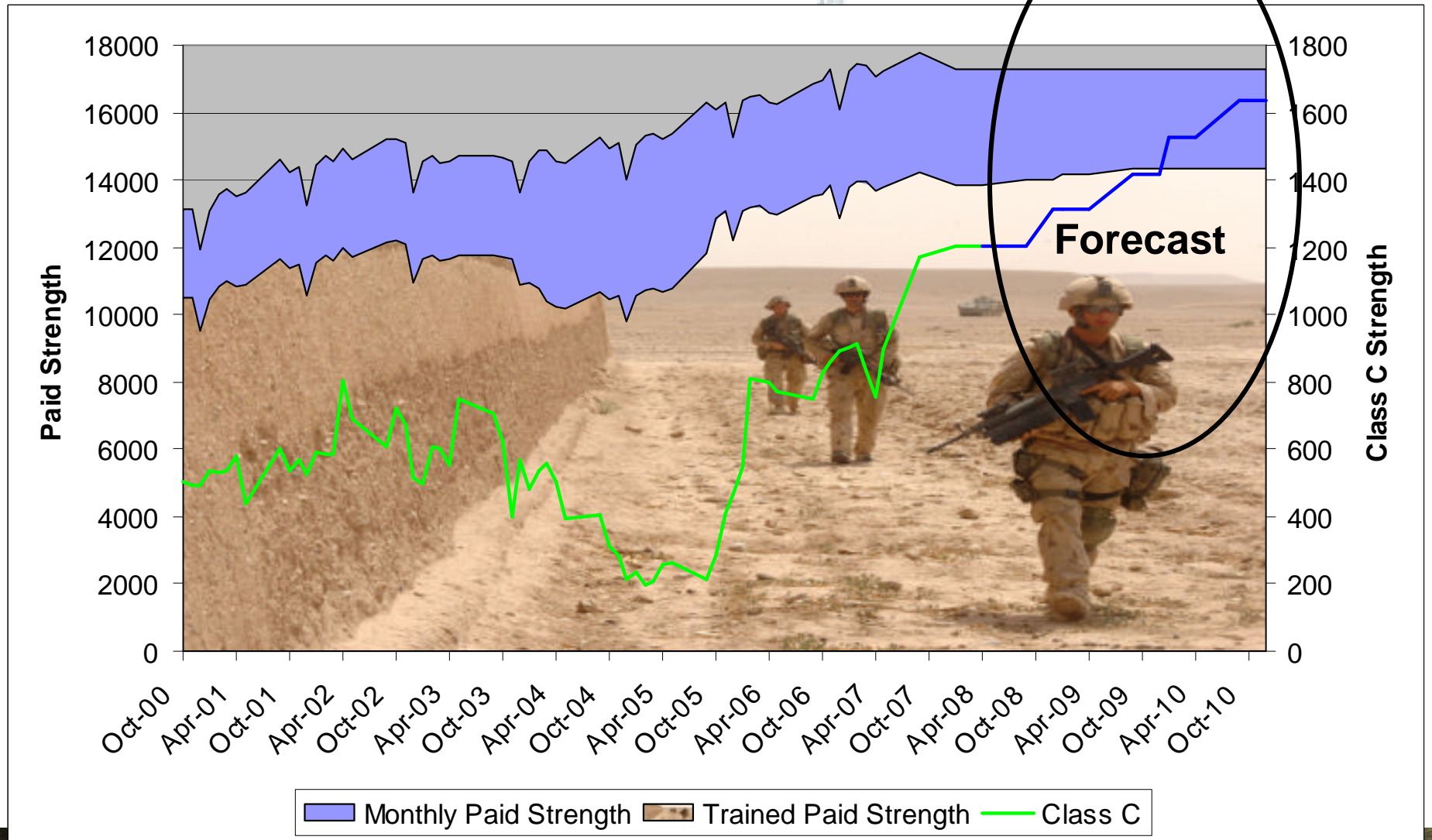
# *Army Reserve Force Generation*

➤ Army Reservists deployed to Afghanistan as follows;

➤ Initial deployments	540
➤ ROTO 1	313
➤ ROTO 2	308
➤ ROTO 3	398
➤ ROTO 4	360
➤ <b>ROTO 5</b>	<b>535</b>
➤ <b>ROTO 6</b>	<b>+435 to date</b>

➤ Total Army Reservist deployed to date **1919**, projected by February 2009 is **+2889**
